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# CBSE class XII Boards may have short tests on major subjects

A high-level meeting called on Sunday discussed that class-XII Board exams must be held, but in a minimised and in-school format, compressed to 90 minutes, instead of the regular three hours and with "very short questions" in 19 major subjects...

According to sources, two options were put on the table for discussion on the exam format by the Central Board of Secondary Education

Option A proposed conducting regular exams for the 19 major subjects at notified exam centres within three months – by August – and assessment of the minor subjects on the basis of this performance. Results would come by September 20 under this option

The option B suggests that to ensure student's safety, exams should be conducted for 19 major subjects in two phases: first from July 15 to August 1, and then from August 5 to August 26. Results under this would be announced by September 5. The option is learnt to have found more favour from most state governments

The idea is that if a student misses one phase due to Covid-19-related concerns, he should be able to appear for the exam in the second phase

The exam would be held within the same schools where the students were enrolled, instead of exam centres, as per this option, and the same would be facilitated with an electronic format question paper

#### JEE Main April-May rounds likely in July-Aug, NEET may be held in Sept



n the event of CBSE conducting class XII Board exams in 19 "major subjects" during July and August, which is being considered as one of the options amid the pandemic, the National Testing Agency (NTA) is likely to conduct the deferred April and May rounds of JEE (Main) at the end of July and August. The agency is also looking at holding NEET-UG for admission to medical courses in a pen-paper mode in September, for which registration may start from July 1, NTA sources said.

NEET-UG was scheduled for August 1 and though registration was to commence in April, NTA kept it in abeyance due to surge in cases. Admissions to IITs, National Institutes of Technology (NITs), and other centrally funded technical institutions (CFTIs) are set to get affected

## EIFFEL TOWER will reopen for visitors on July 16 after months of closure



he Eiffel Tower will reopen on July 16 after several months of closure due to the coronavirus pandemic, the Paris landmark's operator said. The re-opening marks the emergence of the 10-ton metal landmark from its longest closure since World War II. It was shut down for more than three months during the first Covid wave in the spring of last year, and then again in the autumn. Online bookings will open on June 1.

■ Visitor numbers will be limited to 10,000 a day to meet social distancing requirements, fewer than half of their pre-Covid levels ■ All floors of the monument will be accessible to visitors, except some areas where renovation work is ongoing

The monument, completed in 1889, usually receives about seven million visitors every year, some three-quarters of them from abroad. Because of Covid restrictions, it now expects a loss of 70 million euros (\$85 million) for 2021, after a loss of 52 million last year, forcing it to seek fresh financing

#### JOE ROOT PIPS VIRAT KOHLI TO BECOME HIGHEST-PAID CAPTAIN IN 2020/21

ndian team captain Virat Kohli may be one of the highest-paid players in world cricket, but he isn't the highest-paid captain and player, if his salary as an international cricketer is taken into consideration. According to Cricketer.com, England Test captain **Joe Root** is the highest-paid captain, thanks to England Cricket Board's red-ball contracts through which they draw more money than India's Grade A+ players, a salary of around £700,000 per year (₹ 7.22 crore approx).

Not just Root, Jofra Archer is also among the players with a red-ball contract, and draws more salary than the Indian captain. Apart from Kohli, Rohit Sharma and Jasprit Bumrah also have Grade A+ contracts. They have a salary of ₹ 7 crore each. The Grade A+ bracket was introduced in 2018. The players who are regular in all three formats are offered the Grade A+ contract



Kashayam, an integral part of Ayurveda, is any decoction of herbs that delivers the concentrated health properties of the herbs to those drinking it. Essentially, it is water (usually boiled until hot or warm) infused with a herb or a bunch of herbs, so it absorbs the essence of the herbs. Here is an easy way to make your first kashayam to boost your immunity and keep infections at bay:



but then when we realized that no



DJOKOVIC, NADAL EYE HISTORY AT FRENCH OPEN

Roland Garros will see empty stands as night time matches scheduled

ovak Djokovic and Rafael Nadal and will set their sights on more Grand Slam history at Roland Garros as the French Open embraces a new and eerily empty era of night time tennis. A 14th title in Paris for Nadal would take him to a recordsetting 21st major, surpassing the mark he shares with Roger Federer who has already written off his hopes of adding to his lone success in the French capital back in 2009. Djokovic, the champion in 2016, can move to 19 Grand Slam titles with victory. That would make the world number one the first man in over half a century to win all four majors on multiple occasions.

#### Nadal upbeat

■ Nadal arrives in Paris buoyed by having defeated Djokovic in the Rome Masters final in what was the pair's 57th meeting. It was Nadal's 10th title in the Italian capital. Not that he was reading too much into the statistics as far as Roland Garros is concerned. "I think I can work on a couple of things that I can do a little bit better," he insisted. "I just need to keep going. I know what I need to work on and I'm going to do it. Work, relax mentally, and work the right way." At last year's delayed Roland Garros, Nadal swept past Djokovic in straight sets in the final. It was Nadal's 100th win at the tournament against just two losses since his 2005 title-winning debut.

#### Djokovic hopeful

Giving Djokovic hope, however, is the knowledge that he was responsible for one of those losses, in the 2015 quarter-finals. He is also a four-time runner-up although three of those defeats in the championship

#### RAINA MAKES WINNING START IN FRENCH OPEN QUALIFIERS

Indian tennis player Ankita Raina notched up a hardfought win over higherranked Arina Rodionova in the first round of the women's singles qualifiers at the French Open. The 28-year-old Indian, world ranked 182, showed nerves of steel as she bounced back from a set down to beat Russian-born Australian Rodionova, ranked 168th, 3-6 6-1 6-4 in a thrilling rain-affected three-setter. Raina had reached the third round of the qualifiers in the Australian Open, the first Grand Slam of the year. Among other Indians in the fray are Sumit Nagal, Prajnesh Gunneswaran and Ramkumar Ramanathan.

match came against the Spaniard. Only two men have previously managed to win all four of the Slams on more than one occasion, Roy Emerson and Rod Laver of Australia. Laver's achievement came back in 1969. "Ithink I have a good chance to go all the way in Paris, but of course it's a long shot," said Djokovic who captured the season's first Grand Slam title in Australia for a ninth time in February.

#### Not priority for Federer

■ Federer, with his 40th birthday fast approaching, remains the sentimental favourite but his priority will be an as-

sault on Wimbledon where he has been champion eight times. "I'm not so sure in the last 50 years of the French Open, somebody just rocks up at nearly 40 years old, being out for a year and a half, and wins everything straight," said Federer af-

ter losing his only clay court match this year in Geneva last week.

#### A likely contender

- World number five Stefanos Tsitsipas is the most likely man to upset the odds of Nadal and Djokovic again making the final. The 22-year-old Greek who won the prestigious Monte Carlo clay court title in April, had match point before losing the Barcelona final to Nadal and then lifted the Lyon trophy. He has beaten Nadal on clay in Madrid in 2019 and stretched Djokovic to five sets at the 2020 French Open semi-finals.
- This year's Roland Garros will be the second taking place under the shadow of the coronavirus. Just over 5,000 fans a day will be allowed on site until June 9, when that figure rises to 13,000. For the first time this year, there will be nine evening sessions at the tournament. However, a Covid-19 curfew from 9 pm means that eight of those sessions will be played out inside an empty Court Philippe Chatrier. AFP

before the break. Angers grabbed an injury-time consolation to cause some late nerves, but Lille had just a few seconds to wait after restarting the game before celebrating a remarkable achievement. Lille

lost only three games compared to eight for PSG, and Lille also conceded the fewest goals while keeping the most clean sheets.

Elsewhere, Monaco drew 0-0 at Lens to secure third and a place in the Champions League qualifying rounds, with Lyon two points back in fourth. Lyon fluffed its chances by losing 3-2 at home to Nice and enters the Europa League along with fifth-place Marseille. Brest stayed up by one point from eight-time champion Nantes, which lost 2-1 at home to Montpellier to finish in 18th and the promotion-relegation playoff spot with second-tier Toulouse. AP

#### Guardiola wins Manager of the Year award

Anchester City's Pep Guardiola has been named Manager of the Year by England's League Managers' Association. Guardiola steered City to the Premier League title and League Cup this season and this Saturday the Spaniard's side will bid to be crowned kings of Europe for the first time when they face English rivals Chelsea in the Champions League final in Porto.

Former Barcelona and Bayern Munich manager Guardiola topped a poll where the other leading contenders were Leeds' Marcelo Bielsa, Norwich's Daniel Farke, Chelsea women's manager Emma Hayes, West Ham's David Moyes and Leicester's Brendan Rodgers. "I am delighted to win the LMA Manager of the Year award for the second time," said Guardiola. "It is, for me, such a special trophy to win because it is voted for by my fellow managers. An award like this is only possible if a manager is surrounded by top professionals. My players have been fantastic, their dedication and professionalism never wavered," he said.
